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Greetings from Provost Usher

Tomorrow is Election Day! I have voted in every election I have been eligible for, since being a 17 year old allowed to vote in a presidential primary because I turned 18 before the general election. The community spirit around elections has always buoyed me – from good neighbors with signs for opposing candidates helping each other with yard chores to the citizens who volunteer to serve as election officers. I voted early this year, since I have to be in Roanoke early and I didn't want a tie-up on I-81 to keep me from making it to the polls next Tuesday.



Chapman Rockaway, along with colleagues Jean Mistele, Melanie Fox, Heather Keith, Jason Lucas,

and David Beach, conducted a "Civic Incomes" survey in University 100 courses this fall to assess our students' openness to civic engagement as they enter Radford. There were 684 student responses, and overall it shows that students are disposed to make a difference through community action, but they vary in experience and confidence (more to come as that team acts on the survey results.

We can act right now on one result of the survey. Some of the *lowest* overall scores came from getting news from reliable sources, including newspapers, tv, or podcasts (getting news from social media was scarily much higher). Radford University gives every member of our community a **free personal subscription** to the <u>New York Times</u>! Each person can make an account, read the news on your phone, and get access to the podcasts. Please take advantage of this yourself, and share it with your students. To make this work even better, walk them through setting up accounts in class, and you can assign news stories to read and discuss as appropriate in your classes.

My idealistic view of the democratic process may not be the reality in the next few days or weeks, and we may not have the results of this close election for days or even weeks. Being able to find trusted sources of news may help us find common ground as we navigate this time. I urge you to support our students and each other, as embody the threads of the tartan.



New Access to Gale's Indigenous People of North America Collection

VIVA, the Virtual Library of Virginia, purchases and licenses shared collections across the state in order to ensure that all students have access to the same critical core resources, regardless of what institution they attend. Through the SCHEV fund for Excellence and Innovation as well as state funding provided by the General Assembly, VIVA has purchased more exciting resources that are focused on equity, diversity, and inclusion in order to help support research and explore diverse perspectives.

Another exciting resource that is now available to Radford University users through VIVA is the *Indigenous Peoples of North America* collection from Gale. This resource is a comprehensive collection of primary source documents from American and Canadian government sources and institutions, tribal publications, and documents from Indian-related organizations, including a selection of indigenous-language materials. The collection covers topics such as Indian removal, Indian wars and the frontier army, treaty policies, government boarding and missionary schools, Indian languages and linguistics, water and fishing rights, and more. Together, these primary sources enable in-depth study of the political, social, and cultural history of native peoples from the sixteenth century well into the twentieth century.
