Dr. Anthony Guidone, Principal Investigator, Assistant Professor, History

About Dr. Anthony Guidone

Dr. Anthony Guidone received his Ph.D. in American History from George Mason University. His research interests include early American history, New England history, and the history of commerce and exploration. He is currently preparing a book titled *The Empire's City: A Global History of Salem, Massachusetts, 1783-1820*. This book shows how the social, cultural, and economic development of Salem was shaped by the city's trade with Asia in the early years of the United States. He has also completed research projects in Virginia history including digital exhibits on slavery and the descendants of George Mason IV and on the overlapping histories of higher education and civil rights in 1960s Fairfax, Virginia. He teaches classes on early American history, Virginia history, and digital history at Radford.

Dr. Guidone's Project and the Digital Platform



Abstract

Earlier this year, Dr. Guidone and his undergraduate students successfully won a SEED grant to pilot a project that examines the relationship between slavery and medicine in Appalachia through building a digital archive of one of Dr. John Haller's medical ledgers. This digital archive will draw on the PI's training in early nineteenth-century history, digital history, metadata. Outcomes from this project will be used to further development the research into an external grant application to the Commonwealth History Fund (CHF) of the Virginia Museum of History & Culture (VMHC).

On April 3rd, the **2nd Annual Highlander Research Blitz** was hosted by the Office of Undergraduate Research & Scholarship (OURS) and the Office of Graduate Affairs, the event provided an exciting platform for students to showcase their research in a fast-paced, engaging format.

For many Undergraduate students, the event was more than a competition - it was a celebration of their hard work and the research community they have built. Chloe Burt, a junior biology major and first-place winner, reflected on the atmosphere of the evening: *"I genuinely loved the atmosphere that was created. All of the contestants have been chatting about our research, and it's been a fun event. It is a celebration more than a competition."*

Graduate students also made a strong showing at the Blitz, bringing forward compelling research that reflected both academic depth and real-world relevance. MaKayla Dulaney earned 1st place for her exploration of dating apps and attachment styles in *Dating Apps and Attachments: Anxiety and Avoidance in Modern Romance*. Jeff Wolfe took 2nd place with his research on *Understanding Cross-neurotype Communication*, while Kalyn Stiles claimed 3rd place for *Balancing the Equation: Setting Boundaries for a Sustainable Life*. Their presentations not only showcased a wide range of graduate research but also sparked meaningful conversations across disciplines.

We congratulate all of the Undergraduate and Graduate participants for their outstanding contributions and look forward to seeing even more bold and creative scholarship at next year's competition.

Fulbright U.S. Scholar Program

The competition opening means you now have seven months to write your best application, as the due date will be **September 15, 2025 at 5:00 PM EDT (UTC-4:00)**. While this is a generous amount of time for a grant-writing exercise, perhaps the most important step is this first one you will take: choosing one award among [the 380+ opportunities](#) for your application. You can only apply for one award per year/competition cycle, so you will need to choose wisely.

We encourage you to take a look at the online application and the [application page](#), which offers plenty of guidance on how to best spend your seven months to write a Fulbright U.S. Scholar application. The application does not require you to work in one sitting, so the sooner you start working online, the sooner you can see your progress.

The job on the Fulbright Scholar Outreach and Recruitment team is to help you apply, assisting with everything from award choice to the online application. Feel free to visit them during their office hours where they can answer your questions live. You may also reach out to them via email. Sponsored Programs is in the process of updating our website to provide helpful resources for researchers who need assistance with the development of a **data management plan (DMP)**. Included on our website will be access to a SMP Tool which is free, open-source, online application that helps researchers create DMPs. The DMP Tool provides a click-through wizard for creating a data plan that complies with funders' requirements.

Many funding agencies require data management plans as part of a grant proposal application. Even if you are not seeking funding for your research, documenting a plan for your data is always the best practice so Sponsored Programs will soon have valuable resources on our website at your disposal!
